## Why do students complete NAPLAN?

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it's important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It doesn't replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' educational progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

#### Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Schools have transitioned from paper-based to computer-based assessments. All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

Online NAPLAN tests provide more precise results and are more engaging for students. One of the main benefits is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test presents questions which may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

## **Outdoor Learning**



## **SJP Year Two Class News**

We have had a wonderful start to the school year and would like to congratulate all of the Year Two students for commencing 2023 with independence and enthusiasm. There is a real buzz around our classrooms as we reconnect with friends and teachers and learn our new routines. We would like to welcome our new families to Mel Maria. The new students have adjusted well to our Mel Maria community and have enjoyed making many new friendships.



In Religious Education we have recently began our new topic, Lent Easter. We attended mass on Ash Wednesday as we marked the beginning of Lent. We received ashes and were reminded of the sacrifice

Jesus made for us, demonstrating his love for his followers. As Mel Maria takes pride in taking part in a Social Justice Projects, with our values in mind: Compassion, Justice, Respect, and Service, we have decided, as a cohort, to collect toiletries and socks for St Patrick's Community Centre in Fremantle. At the end of Lent we will deliver all our donations. Our baskets are in our classroom and we look forward to carrying out our motto of making a difference everyday.

In English, we have been focusing on recount writing and orally recounting an event. We have been using our handwriting lessons and writing lessons to ensure we write with correct letter formation and sizing. We have also been using our Big Books "Ratty Tatty Cat" and "Pirate Polly" to focus on comprehension, fluency, reading and spelling strategies.

In Math's, we have been focusing on place value and number recognition. We have been using MAB blocks to model, represent, order and recognise numbers up to 1000, and have been practising our skip counting in 2s, 5s, and 10s. We have also been looking at calendars and gathering data to represent in a table.

We were lucky enough to begin our Science inquiry of forces and motion by attending a STEM incursion. We had the opportunity to construct a swing boat machine made out of Lego by following picture instructions. This incursion was engaging and fun especially when our machines were ready to be tested by a motor.

In Health, we have started our term with getting to know each other and creating "Friendship Soups" to understand what we desire in a good friendship. We have also been looking at our Keeping Safe program and investigating our emotions; how they impact our actions and what we can do when we are feeling a strong emotion.

This week was the first week of swimming lessons for Year 2. We love getting on the bus each day and enjoy learning news skills and how to keep safe around water. This has fitted in well with our Health lessons as we have had the opportunity to take care of our bodies through exercise and practice behaviours that keep us safe.













## **PN Year Two Class News**

In Religious Education we have been learning about the Church and the important ways people show respect in God's holy place. We've also started learning that Lent is a special time to prepare for Easter. We attended Mass on Ash Wednesday and were each blessed with a cross of ashes on our foreheads to remind us to live as Jesus taught.

In English we are focusing on structuring our writing correctly, understanding what we have read, and listening for the sounds in words so we can spell them. Thank you to our fabulous parents who helped us make pancakes on Shrove Tuesday. This was an engaging shared language experience used to introduce procedural texts.

In Maths we've been reading calendars and other tables. We've had a look at fractions and how they relate to telling time on an analogue clock, and we are recognising how analogue times are displayed on digital clocks. We're also practising our skip counting, addition and subtraction.

Last week, we had a STEM incursion in which the children had the opportunity to build simple Lego machines that move with a motor. This task allowed them to apply what we are learning about forces (in Science), procedures (in English) and teamwork (in Health).

In Health, we started the year by focusing on getting to know each other, rules (that keep us safe, help us learn and make games fun), listening skills, teamwork and kind behaviour. We have also had the opportunity to practise behaviours that keep us healthy and safe. We can take care of ourselves by exercising our bodies and also relaxing through breathing exercises and meditation. In addition, we've started the Highways Heroes program. This program uses the metaphor of the Highway of Life to help children understand the bumps and hazards we can encounter on life's journey, and we are learning to use the tools we need to navigate them.

## Noongar Kaartdijin

On Tuesday March 8 we celebrated International Women's Day. The theme this year is DigitALL: Innovation and Technology for Gender Equality. In the library we celebrated IWD by learning the Noongar word for woman - yorga.

The Noongar symbol for woman is pictured here.

The U shape denotes a person while the line represents a digging stick, a sharpened tool that women use to unearth bush tucker (yams, carrots, witchery grubs, honey ants etc.). Variations of this symbol may include other lines that represent a coolamon (a long oval bowl made from tree bark that is used for carrying bush tucker). You can see the noongar symbol for woman in the noongar symbol for family pictured here.

The Library has many books that showcase women's achievements throughout history.

#### **Wastewise News**

Mel Maria Libraries have Recycling station that recycle, soft plastic, bottle tops, cartridges, batteries, used writing instruments, paper and bread ties. The alternative to dropping off your recyclables at the library is to go to your local recycling depots. Mel Maria is also a part of the State Government and CEWA ban on single use plastics.

In the Library we have been look at regeneration and how we should plant native plants and consider the insects that are affected by the heat. A simple solution is to create a bee drinking station. Place small stones in a dish and half with water. See the diagram below.

## E-safety at Mel Maria

## From the School Social Worker

Catholic Education WA (CEWA) schools are Christ-centred and child-focused learning communities that support each child to develop to their full God-given potential. Key to this is ensuring the learning environment is engaging, supportive and safe.

All members of our school share the responsibility for creating and maintaining this healthy culture. By working together we can ensure all children flourish in a safe and healthy environment.



Recognising that each child has the right to be heard is an important element in the CEWA Child Safe Framework. At our school students are taught that they have the right to be safe and we empower them with the language, skills and strategies to assist in their safety by talking to people that they trust. It is a requirement that all students receive a protective behaviours and abuse prevention education.

We are continuing to implement the *Keeping Safe*: Child Protection Curriculum (KS:CPC). This is an evidence-based child safety program that teaches children to recognise abuse, tell a trusted adult, understand what is appropriate and inappropriate touching and ways of keeping themselves safe. The KS:CPC fits primarily within the Health and Physical Education learning area of the Australian Curriculum but is also taught across multiple learning areas, including Religious Education.

The curriculum is based on two main themes:

- We all have the right to be safe
- We can help ourselves to be safe by talking to people we trust.

The themes are presented through four Focus Areas:

**Focus Area 1:** The right to be safe, including topics such as identifying feelings, early warning signs, and emergency situations.

Focus Area 2: Relationships, including topics such as identifying trusted networks, and dealing with bullying.

**Focus Area 3:** Recognising and reporting unsafe situations, including topics such as privacy and the body, and cyber safety.

**Focus Area 4:** <u>Protective strategies</u> for keeping safe, including topics such as assertiveness, problem solving and persistence.

Our school relies on strong partnerships with you, as parents and carers, to provide your child with the best possible learning and development opportunities. Working together we can ensure all children and young people flourish in a safe and healthy environment. If you have any further questions about this information or the Keeping Safe Child Protection Curriculum in general, please speak with your classroom teacher, the Principal or the school social worker.
